Along with establishing a pipeline of future culinary arts and hospitality students, Cooper sees the opportunity to develop a new gold standard for culinary programs in Virginia. This includes supporting initiatives like the <u>Kitchen at Reynolds</u> and the <u>Richmond Black Restaurant Experience</u>, as well as expanding the <u>Mercy Chefs</u> program throughout the Commonwealth.

"We need to work together as an industry and show today's youth how to embark on a career in hospitality," says Cooper. "I'm excited to champion this urgent work, and to advocate for additional resources from the governor's office and administration, which I know is highly supportive of Virginia Hospitality and Tourism."

Cooper also serves as a distinguished member of the State Board of Directors for VRLTA and is the former Chairman of the VRLTA's Shenandoah Valley Chapter. He has also been involved with Mercy Chefs, a faith-based, non-profit disaster and humanitarian relief organization, and won the Ordinary Award for Virginia Hotelier of the Year in 2020.
